

Nicasa Behavioral Health Services is a behavioral health and social service organization that provides education, prevention, harm reduction, early intervention, treatment, and recovery services and support to help youth, adults, and their families achieve their greatest human potential. This is realized through the mission of the organization, which is to transform one life at a time through our behavioral health and social services. The organization can be found enhancing various communities at five sites throughout Lake County. The vision is emphasized through growth and flexibility so that services can support individuals and families, wherever they may be, thereby improving communities and becoming a premier behavioral health and social service provider. The mission and vision are supported by a network of dedicated and caring professionals who exhibit award-winning skills when working with individuals across the continuum of care. Staff members approach all situations and services with respect for all individuals, provide services in a diverse and culturally responsive manner, and ground all efforts in the shared values of the organization, which are advocacy, service excellence, inclusivity, integrity, and compassion.



### Letter Leadership

Dear Friends,

In 2023 we entered our 57th year of service to the community. Sustained growth coupled with courageous flexibility guided our year. As people continued to proactively engage in help-seeking behaviors, Nicasa looked for new ways to meet their current and future needs. We continued our face-to-face community work and harm reduction techniques, financial assistance for families, and more. Nicasa also enhanced its awareness and prevention approaches by expanding to elementary level, in-school prevention programming, and training more than 1,200 community residents and first responders on how to use Narcan to save a life. Nicasa strengthened its commitment to diversity, equity, justice, and inclusion, as a fabric of the organization, and answered the call to fill a gap where services have been desperately needed for helping professionals in an accessible, inclusive, private, and calming space all their own.

Highlights from the year include:

The **Healthy Futures Fund** (Nicasa's Endowment Fund) was created in 2020 with a matching opportunity from the Healthcare Foundation of Northern Lake County, the first of its kind provided by the foundation. This fund is essential for our future in times of crisis, like the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as for the sustainability and growth of our programming. In 2023 many people saw the continued need for leaving a legacy and ensuring a future in which Nicasa's work can continue, which allowed the fund to grow to a **total of \$1,000,000** by the end of the fiscal year.

Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine selected Nicasa as for a pilot project that focuses on providing prevention information and Narcan to identified overdose "hot spots" throughout western Lake County. In this Block-by-Block program Nicasa knocks on every residence and business in these areas to provide life-saving Narcan along with education on the signs and symptoms of an overdose, as well as where to seek help.

Nicasa was awarded funding from the Lake County Board as part of American Rescue Plan Act funds to **create a new First Responder and Veteran Wellness Center** for current and former first responders, active service members, veterans, and their family members. This new center will be the **first of its kind in Lake County** and will provide behavioral health and wellness services to these helping professionals who often experience repeated instances of traumatic events that result in increased rates of substance use, problem gambling, mental health crises, and suicide.

Strength and responsibility are a part of the guiding principles of recovery, as well as being holistic and supporting the concept of multiple pathways. Looking ahead, we are focused on maximizing our strengths as we believe it is our responsibility to provide the best possible care to the communities we serve. Additionally, we are using our holistic approaches to care for others while supporting their multiple experiences in achieving recovery, thereby leading to improved health and wellness.

We honor and thank you for your support and partnership with us to improve the lives of all Lake County residents so we may all benefit from a safer and healthier community. ### 80% of Prevention Services program participants will attend all prevention education sessions.

Nicasa provides the evidence-based curriculum "Too Good For Drugs" in 12 middle schools and 1 elementary school across Waukegan, Mundelein, and Wauconda to teach about youth substance use and the ways in which it can be prevented. In FY23, 93% of students received the full curriculum and additional booster sessions.

### 80% of Teen Court participants will not re-offend within 12 months of case closure.

Teen Court, one of the largest and oldest peer jury programs in Illinois, is a collaborative effort between Nicasa, local police departments, and the Lake County Sheriff's Department. The goal is to give youth a second chance who have committed a criminal offense by connecting meaning with behavior in order to develop positive and healthy lifestyles, free of delinquent acts. In FY23, 85% of youth who successfully completed the program did not re-offend within 12 months of closing their case.

### 70% of substance use, mental health, and problem gambling clients will complete treatment successfully.

Nicasa provides outpatient, intensive outpatient, and an adult residential recovery halfway house as a means to provide behavioral health services, based on the individualized needs of clients who need help. In FY23, 93% of substance use clients, 60% of mental health clients, 69% of problem gambling clients, and 69% of Bridge House clients all completed their treatment successfully.

### 100% of Family Advocacy Center Services clients will receive a family assessment and will not experience instances of abuse and/or neglect.

The Family Advocacy Center, created in 2010, provides parenting, communication, family support, basic needs assistance, and more to stabilize family units and teach them healthy skills so they remain intact without child welfare involvement. In FY23, 100% of families received an individualized assessment and did not experience any instances of abuse and/or neglect while they were engaged in the program.





## **Strategy**

Nicasa Behavioral Health Services provides a continuum of care comprised of education, prevention, harm reduction, early intervention, treatment, and recovery services.

This is accomplished via individualized outpatient and intensive outpatient treatment, which includes individual and group modalities. The organization also provides a variety of prevention programming to improve community education, safety, and wellness, while also moving forward with innovative programming, such as diversion and deflection services, supportive services for child welfare, and specialized programming for individuals experiencing co-occurring substance use and mental health difficulties accompanied by other complexities. For those who require a heightened level of treatment, the organization also maintains an adult residential recovery halfway house for ongoing intensive care to best prepare them for independent living in the future.

A variety of licensed and credentialed staff, including certified alcohol and drug counselors, certified peer recovery support specialists, licensed social workers (clinical and non-clinical), licensed professional counselors (clinical and non-clinical), and certified problem gambling counselors help realize these strategies. A majority of employees have tenure for 10, 15, 20, and over 30 years which emphasizes not only consistency and an enhanced level of care, but also speaks to the impact that Nicasa Behavioral Health Services has on the community.

In-School Prevention educated thousands of children throughout Waukegan, Mundelein, Wauconda, and Island Lake elementary and middle schools with "Too Good For Drugs" curriculum.

Prevention goes beyond the school to involve parents, guardians, and community leaders so everyone in the community can be involved. Prevention provided education and training on Narcan, harm reduction, and a "Stay Out Of My Room" display so that caregivers can informative conversations with their children.





They also provided communication campaigns that help to provide information and statistics about substance use in the communities Nicasa serves. The continued focus of these campaigns are to decrease and prevent underage consumption of alcohol, vaping, marijuana use, and caregiver approval of underage usage of these products. A key component of this messaging is to prevent the normalization of substance usage as a part of growing up, and instead highlight the possible negative consequences of use and misuse of substances.

Teen Jurors Help Their Peers & Learn Leadership

In 2023, Teen Court helped 55 youth through restorative justice practices. Restorative justice is built upon community engagement and connecting meaning with behaviors, without a punitive action held against the teen participant.

Teen Court helps not only those who have committed a transgression, but improves the lives of those who volunteer. In 2023, 61 teens volunteered their time and skills as jurors, attorneys, clerks, forepersons, and bailiffs across 3 courts in Lake County. Their supportive, constructive sentences empowered youth participants to find healthy alternatives and coping skills so they can make better decisions in the future.



Over 5,700 served since 1996

Participants responded best to the following alternative sentences:

- Letter to their future selves
- Chore chain to see how actions have interconnected consequences
- Letter to the person who was wronged
- Poster of positive influences and role models
- Build-A-Bike Workshop
- Terms as a juror

Alternative sentences help teens learn from their mistakes while developing new life strategies. They help the teen learn critical thinking skills, empathy, and responsibility while being accountable for their actions.

## M [ Program Wins

### A Young Woman Chooses To Be Positive In the Face Of Adversity

A young woman successfully completed her treatment related to a DUI she received. Despite being charged with a DUI, the woman maintained a positive attitude about the experience. Her time in treatment allowed her to explore her relationship with alcohol and how it was affecting her health. She started going to the gym more often, and maintained her sobriety from alcohol.

However, due to the DUI charge, this woman lost her Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status. While uncertain of what the future holds, she continued to remain positive. As a result of her commitment to treatment, cooperation with the justice system, and being a first-time offense, the charge was changed to reckless driving. She was informed that she could then re-apply to renew her DACA status again.

### A Friend In Need

A former TREE participant who had attended sporadically during the past 4 years reached out to his former counselor. They had two goals when reaching out this time. They wanted to share how they had been successful since their last contact and also returned to ask for help (a positive skill they learned from their last engagement with Nicasa). Things had been going much smoother for them and they reflected on how they had overcome their challenges in part because of the TREE Counselor's guidance. They also had identified someone in their life who needed some help. This person was in need of services and needed someone to support them, like this former TREE client had been supported by Nicasa.

This referral is crucial because it shows the client's continued growth since leaving Nicasa's care. They wanted to share a safe, supportive space with their friend, and they were proud to be able to pay it forward. This tells Nicasa that we are consistently moving in a positive direction and individuals are finding long-term benefits from treatment.

### Meeting Immediate Needs While Planning For The Future

A young man expressed a need for clothing to his group counselor. Because he was involved with our TREE program, the supervisor and counselor were able to dedicate additional time to determine his specific needs, which were both for employment and in general. Together, the young man and counselor discussed the client's plans to utilize this clothing to seek employment.

The TREE Program then obtained a gift card for the client and assisted him with purchasing an outfit to use for job interviews, as well as clothing for everyday use. The client was thankful for the additional support from the TREE program and stated he is looking forward finding a job and sharing about this positive experience with his parole officer. He left Nicasa feeling empowered and hopeful for the future.

## M Gambling



An important feature of Nicasa's Gambling program is our outreach. In 2023, Elizabeth Thielen, Senior Director of Substance Abuse services, and her outreach team held multiple events in Illinois to educate people on disordered gambling, warning signs, and the treatment options available. They also engaged 63 people, with complex problem gambling needs, in specialized treatment with Nicasa.

Nicasa also participated in the February 2023 Lake County Rising. This year was "Love, Unchained: Finding, Defining, Reclaiming Voices."

This uplifting event consistently sends a positive message of love, acceptance, and resiliency for those who have experienced the impact of domestic violence. It was an evening of vulnerability, strength, and reclaiming one's identity. Nicasa recognizes the powerful intersectionality of the care we provide and the broader connections to the human experience.

Attending resource fairs, wellness markets, and other pop-up events is a team member favorite. Many of our team members enjoy seeing their family and friends at these events, and providing information about mental health, substance use, gambling, and other services within Nicasa's continuum of care.









### Taking Back The Narrative

### Change Is Coming

An adult client completed his program successfully. He reported reaching 8 months of sobriety and admitted that was not his intention when he began his outpatient group almost one year ago. The man had learned so much about the effects of drugs. He saw how treatment improved his life. He kept improving his focus and living healthier the longer he was in recovery. The positive benefits of practicing sobriety led him to stay on track. The fear of not being able to live without using was gone for the first time. He is 35 years old and is now thinking about wanting to have a family. This was the first time he thought he could achieve something positive for himself. He also realized that he is capable of running the restaurant where he works. He is now living on his own and concentrating on getting his license back. This man started treatment full of doubt, and now cannot imagine life any other way.

### There Is Always Time To Make Things Right

A mother with two differently-abled children that have high needs came to Nicasa's Family Advocacy Center seeking assistance with food and other essential needs. The FAC Facilitator tried to help the client access state benefits. However, as an undocumented, single parent, the mother attempted to receive help 4 years ago, by asking a family member to be the recipient of benefits for her family. For 4 years this family member had been keeping all payments, medical insurance, and food stamps while lying to the mother that no benefits were received each month. This mother struggled to maintain housing for her children, food on the table, and medical appointments because of this lie. The FAC Facilitator was able to assist her with going to the Social Security Administration, reporting that her family member was committing fraud, and helped her file a formal complaint. The mother and her children were finally compensated for all of their eligible benefits and the mother was able to provide for the medical care and basic needs of her children.

### Former Clients Share Their Stories

Strength is a paradox. Many feel the pull to be strong at the cost of sacrificing themselves. Strength is vulnerability. It is hard to be vulnerable with yourself. It is even harder with strangers. Our clients bare their souls to each other during group. Not only to understand themselves, but to form deeper connections with others in the future. One brave individual shared this original poem on their last day of group.

#### Overdose

A poem from a former client

What are you doing? Where am I at? Is this a coffin I'm in? Why are all these people all gathered around? How come there's not any sound?

I'm getting the creeps; can someone help me up? I can't move my arms or my legs. Ok, wait a minute, let me go over the facts-Why is everyone here wearing black?

I was taking a hit when suddenly I heard someone call my name.

Over and over and over again.

But I'm not sure what happened then.

Did I overdose? No way, not me This could never happen to me But here I lay as I watch you cry Now I think I figured out why.

They told me to stop, but I didn't care. It's my life, I'll do as I please. I wish I would've listened to them all before Now, it's not my life anymore.


## M Will Counselors
