Nicasa Behavioral Health Services is a behavioral health and social service organization that provides education, prevention, harm reduction, early intervention, treatment, and recovery services to help youth, adults, and their families achieve their greatest human potential. This is realized through the mission of the organization, which is to transform one life at a time through our behavioral health and social services. The organization can be found enhancing various communities at five sites throughout Lake County. The vision is emphasized through growth and flexibility so that services can support individuals and families, wherever they may be, thereby improving communities and becoming a premier behavioral health and social service provider. The mission and vision are supported by a network of dedicated and caring professionals who exhibit award-winning skills when working with individuals across the continuum of care. Staff members approach all situations and services with respect for all individuals, provide services in a diverse and culturally responsive manner, and ground all efforts in the shared values of the organization.



Dear Friends.

In 2023 we entered our 57th year of service to the community, a year marked by innovation, resilience, and unwavering commitment to those we serve. We continued more in-person community work and harm reduction trainings, provided financial assistance for families, and focused on filling holistic approaches to behavioral health care for youth and adults. Nicasa also continued its commitment to diversity, equity, justice, and inclusion, as a fabric of the organization, and began working on capital improvements to enhance our services by providing high-quality, accessible sites that provide inclusive, welcoming, and calming environments in which to receive care.

Innovation: This year, we leveraged American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, as awarded by the county, to launch the beginning stages of program planning for Lake County's first-ever behavioral wellness center dedicated to current and former first responders, active duty, reservists, veterans, and their family members, as well as complementary behavioral health care coordination services for our current behavioral health service recipients to holistically address additional challenges preventing them from reaching their best point of recovery and symptom management. With multi-year funding awarded for both of these programs, Nicasa was able to begin addressing emerging challenges and strengthen the community's well-being, allowing us to think boldly and implement solutions that will endure beyond this year.

Resilience: We also secured three-year funding for our Stable Families Fund to continue providing direct client assistance, ensuring that families have access to food and medication without having to decide between health and housing costs. This stability is critical for those navigating economic uncertainty and rebuilding their lives to ensure their families remain intact.

Commitment: As part of our ongoing advocacy regarding the importance of providing problem gambling treatment, education, and outreach, Lake County Community Development understood the persistent and growing need for this specialized type of care, thereby creating a multi-year funding commitment that was automatically included as part of the funds received from video game machine terminals that are re-invested back in to community providers and services. For the next three years, this guaranteed funding allows for a proactive approach in which Nicasa can ensure that help is available for those affected by gambling-related harm, allows us to reduce stigma and promote recovery.

In addition to this advocacy, we also remained steadfast in our work of educating the community on saving lives from overdose and preventing more from happening in the future. To combat the harm caused by the opioid epidemic, Nicasa was honored to receive a highly competitive grant, as funded by the opioid settlement funds awarded to IL, that is dedicated to harm reduction and outreach with our unhoused neighbors living with substance use challenges. This funding enables us to provide basic necessities, compassionate connection with staff who are individuals with lived experience, and pathways treatment, hope, and healing. Together, connection and education and supporting individuals in need of care, providing lifesaving information and Narcan to the community at-large, and decreasing overdoses as a whole so all community members can reach their full potential.

None of these achievements would be possible without the dedication of our staff, interns, donors, volunteers, Board of Directors, and partners—and the trust of our community. We honor and thank you for your support and partnership with us to improve the lives of all Lake County residents so we may all benefit from a safer and healthier community. Together, we are building a future where every person has the opportunity to thrive.

## G O A L S

80% of Prevention Services program participants will attend all prevention education sessions.

Nicasa provides the evidence-based curriculum "Too Good For Drugs" in 12 middle schools across Waukegan, Mundelein, and Wauconda to teach about youth substance use and the ways in which it can be prevented. In FY24, 100% of students received the full curriculum and additional booster sessions.

### 80% of Teen Court participants will not re-offend within 12 months of case closure.

Teen Court, one of the largest and oldest peer jury programs in Illinois, is a collaborative effort between Nicasa, local police departments, and the Lake County Sheriff's Department. The goal is to give youth a second chance who have committed a criminal offense by connecting meaning with behavior in order to develop positive and healthy lifestyles, free of delinquent acts. In FY24, 94% of youth who successfully completed the program did not re-offend within 12 months of closing their case.


## 70% of substance use, mental health, and problem gambling clients will complete treatment successfully.

Nicasa provides outpatient, intensive outpatient, and an adult residential recovery halfway house as a means to provide behavioral health services, based on the individualized needs of clients who need help. In FY24, 77% of substance use clients, 70% of mental health clients, 88% of problem gambling clients, and 70% of Bridge House clients all completed their treatment successfully.

### 100% of Family Advocacy Center Services clients will receive a family assessment and will not experience instances of abuse and/or neglect.

The Family Advocacy Center, created in 2010, provides parenting, communication, family support, basic needs assistance, and more to stabilize family units and teach them healthy skills so they remain intact without child welfare involvement. In FY24, 100% of families received an individualized assessment and did not experience any instances of abuse and/or neglect while they were engaged in the program.







## Strategy

### Nicasa Behavioral Health Services provides a continuum of care comprised of education, prevention, harm reduction, early intervention, treatment, and recovery services.

This is accomplished via individualized outpatient and intensive outpatient treatment, which includes individual and group modalities. The organization also provides a variety of prevention programming to improve community education, safety, and wellness, while also moving forward with innovative programming, such as diversion and deflection services, supportive services for child welfare, and specialized programming for individuals experiencing co-occurring substance use and mental health difficulties accompanied by other complexities. For those who require a heightened level of treatment, the organization also maintains an adult residential recovery halfway house for more intensive care to best prepare them for independent living in the future.

A variety of licensed and credentialed staff, including certified alcohol and drug counselors, certified peer recovery support specialists, licensed social workers (clinical and non-clinical), licensed professional counselors (clinical and non-clinical), and certified problem gambling counselors help realize these strategies. A majority of employees have tenure for 10, 15, 20, and over 30 years which emphasizes not only consistency and an enhanced level of care, but also speaks to the impact that Nicasa Behavioral Health Services has on the community.

### PREVENTION

At Nicasa it's action taken to provide healthy alternatives today for brighter futures.

Prevention had an incredible year. In-School teams educated thousands of students, teachers, and caregivers about substance use with evidenced-based curriculums, self-esteem building activities, and informational experiences. The "Stay Out Of My Room" displays continued to be a big hit with educators and caregivers. This event not only helps caregivers learn the signs of early substance use with adolescents and teens, but also ways they can have conversations with them about these topics.

While providing the "Too Good For Drugs" curriculum to Wauconda, Island Lake, Waukegan, and Mundelein middle schools, staff also engaged in community outreach events. They attended many farmers markets, health fairs, and drug take-back days so everyone in the community can have a healthier future. Some even donated their personal time to help make their communities a better place for everyone.

### Balanced and Restorative Justice For All in Lake County.

Nicasa's Teen Court program helps not only those participating, but also the peer jurors, adult volunteers, and the entire community. The success of Teen Court is rooted in its approach to how cases are heard, and removing the typical punitive nature of traditional court cases. The participant is heard by other teens, and is provided constructive, alternative sentences so they can not only learn from their mistake, but find resources, create new tools, and receive treatment to help connect the meaning with their behaviors so they can thrive into adulthood.

A TREE client was informed after filling out a job application that a major grocery store would not be moving forward with offering him employment due to him disclosing a conviction. The hiring manager concerned it may impact the safety and security of the customers and employees. While frustrated, he found he had an opportunity further discuss the to convictions and provide evidence of rehabilitation to appeal their decision. The client worked with his TREE counselor to draft an email with further explanation of the conviction, treatment, and rehabilitation he has received. He was then successfully able to appeal that decision because of his hard work in treatment, and was hired.

Even though the first phase of the program ended TREE with the completion of a 5-year federal grant in September 2023, the next phase of is in full swing. Individuals continue to be offered additional intensive clinical management services. receive assistance with employment resources and applications, housing resources and programs, educational opportunities, assistance programs, basic computer skills, clothing, and diapers. Clients continue to receive additional support and validation so they can make treatment their first priority.





### Bridge House 81 lives transformed.

From innovative expressive therapy opportunities through Art Impact Project, to group therapy sessions, Bridge House continues to affirm and validate lived experiences in a home-like setting so residents can begin to craft their new futures that include sobriety. We are so proud of all past and current residents who found themselves and a new community at Bridge House.



### GAMBLING Outreach & Treatment That Overcome Stigma















Gambling had an incredible year that culminated in an exciting opportunity made possible by State Senator Mary Edly-Allen (D-31). Nicasa is now the proud owner of a new vehicle that will be instrumental in Nicasa's robust community outreach program for spreading awareness of problem gambling and connect with more individuals who are experiencing complications from their gambling habits.

Our Teen Volunteer Creative Gambling Group also participated in their own outreach activities while experimenting with technology. They created virtual simulations with real-life gambling scenarios encounter by youth, and new materials to engage their peers and caregivers alike in new ways.




### Nicasa's Primary Specialty Is New Beginnings

A mother of 8 children was referred to Nicasa's Family Advocacy Center after surviving domestic violence from her partner. The family was living in a two-bedroom apartment and was in need of urgent help. She completed parenting classes, obtained diapers, food, and clothing from our Family Advocacy Center, and help with a housing voucher from DCFS for a home that would better meet their family's needs. While in search of a home, an incident occurred that made it unsafe for the mother and her children to remain in Lake County. With the collaborative work between DCFS, Catholic Charities, and Nicasa, the housing voucher was transferred to a different state. She and her family were provided with plane tickets to help make the move easier. She was connected to social service agencies in the new state to help her get started with a new life. The mother and her 8 children are very grateful for all the help, and she now feels more confident in her ability to keep her family safe.

### **Living For A New Mission**

A past intensive outpatient client reached out to update his former counselor about how things have been going since he completed his treatment. When admitted to treatment, he was at risk of homelessness and was unable to afford his basic needs. He has since moved to a transitional living home for veterans. He is working for that same veterans organization and identified how it has, "given [him] a sense of purpose." He has also reconnected with family members whom he had lost touch with due to his illness. He was excited about finally being able to afford much needed dental work as well. He was truly grateful for the support and kindness he received at Nicasa and told his counselor, "I wouldn't be alive without you."









### Personal & Professional Growth

Nicasa's staff are constantly finding new ways to grow, so they can help the individuals in our care to thrive.

Nicasa employs a team of behavioral health and social service professionals, including clinicians, counselors, social workers, advocates, peers with lived experience, interns, administrative professionals, and more, who help us realize our mission of transforming one life at a time through our behavioral health and social services in Lake County.

We celebrated our longevity award recipients, Jennifer Larson and Selene Castro, at our Annual In-Service Training Day. We also recognized Andrea Fajardo-Ochoa for her outstanding skills and service with our Hector Rodriguez Customer Service award. And we celebrated Nina Naus, Cate Brown, Amber Shrum, and Tashia-Marie Mauch on their graduations from their university programs.









